Facts about Thunder Bay

- The Forest Sector is important to the economic foundation of Thunder Bay as it employs 10% of the local workforce.
- Some 1.4 million visitors generate \$350 million for the local economy every year.
- Thunder Bay is Northwestern Ontario's health care centre, with 68% of the region's physicians
 practicing here. The new Thunder Bay Regional Hospital was completed in February, 2004 at
 a cost in excess of \$255 million. The 651,000 square foot facility will have 375 acute care beds.
- Confederation College with an enrollment of 3,200 full time post-secondary students, 400 apprentices, 550 Adult training students and 17,000 continuing education students employs 420 full time and 330 part time employees. Numerous programs of study include aviation, Multimedia, Health Sciences, Internationals Business, and Aboriginal Studies.
- Lakehead University has an enrollment of 6,800 full time and 2,500 part time students and
 employs more than 2,400 on a full and part time basis. While many of its programs are oriented
 to the needs of North Western Ontario, some of its programs are unique in Canada, such as a
 combined diploma program in Engineering Technology with a Bachelor of Engineering degree
 program. In 2003 \$95.3 million was granted by the province to fund a new medical school for
 Northern Ontario with facilities to be shared by Lakehead University and Laurentian University
 (Sault Ste. Marie).
- The Canada/United States border is 32 miles south of the city. Minneapolis, Minnesota is the closest major U.S. Centre
- Thunder Bay International Airport serves half a million passengers every year.
- The Port of Thunder Bay has recently seen new investment of \$1,000,000 in grain handling facilities and handled shipments of pulp to overseas markets. Over 7 million metric tonnes of cargo pass through the port annually.
- Due to its strategic location in the heart of the country Thunder Bay is home to over 75 trucking firms serving the distribution needs of North Western Ontario.
- Thunder Bay Telephone is the largest independent telephone system in Canada, offering some of the lowest rates in the country. Thunder Bay was recently chosen as a call centre by The Responsive Marketing Group creating 100 new jobs. Another call centre was established in 1999 by SB Direct Com employing 250 full and part time workers.
- Within a 500-mile radius of Thunder Bay, the market area population is an astounding 21.5 million people.

- The Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation opened a new \$40,000,000, 50,000 square foot charity casino in August 2000. It currently averages 2,600 patrons/day and has an annual payroll of approximately \$10,000,000 and contributes in excess of \$2,500,000 annually to the City.
- Bombardier Transportation is one of Thunder Bay's largest manufacturers employing in excess of 400 workers manufacturing commuter rail passenger coaches. Successful contracts have been secured from GO Transit, the cities of Toronto, Seattle, and Los Angeles and recently a 1,000,000 man-hour contract from Via Rail Canada.
- Bowater and Abitibi Consolidated continue to upgrade pulp and paper operations and are investing in excess of \$125,000,000 in their facilities.
- In 1999 "Silver City Thunder Bay" with 12 state-of-the-art screens was opened by Famous Players Inc.
- Development Thunder Bay reports entrepreneurship is growing 4% faster in Thunder Bay than in Canada.
